lectio // Mark 4:30-34

Are these questions, prayers? Are they thoughts, spoken out loud? This is red letter stuff! Mark captures, then comments. Didn't anyone tell Jesus that people want truth communicated with facts, charts and slide decks? And then for us to have a privileged purview into the mind of Christ - OMG, what is he thinking about... what's the best story for this truth? Mark later explained, "Jesus used many similar stories and illustrations to teach the people as much as they could understand. In fact, in his public ministry he never taught without using parables; but afterward, when he was alone with his disciples, he explained everything to them." Don't we do it exactly backwards? I mean, don't we explain truth up front (public) and then tell the best backstories to our friends (private). Why do we do that? Why do business leaders give these heady, fact and graph laden presentations with funders, but then tell the good stuff with their own staff. The quotes, the passion, the WHY - is all private. Even our sermons are filled with facts, figures, proofs and outlined logic, but with friends we talk about being a failure at gardening or putting Ikea furniture together backwards! Jesus told the story because that's really how people learn. Well, at least they are able to re-tell the truth they've learned without prompts or notes.
