

lectio // Psalm 142

Between 15 years old when I said "yes" to God, until 20 years old struggling on my own to negotiate love, job, school and life. This is why I spent time reading Psalms. But it was his honesty and transparency, written here in these passages, that brought comfort to me. As I prayed the prayer of complaint, I also followed with his prayer of conclusion: "You are my refuge, you are all I really want in life." And, I added, "all I really need." There have been a few times later on in my life that I felt like I was being stripped of everything I had gained or earned. The girl, the job, the family, the education and the honor and prestige of being a pastor, I worked hard and trusted God to get to those places. Then a few things happened that made me realize that it could all be taken away or I could do something stupid and lose it all. Whether it was a major financial or ministry setback or just poor decisions on my part, I had to come back to the simplicity of David's words. God is all I really wanted AND needed in my life. If I lost EVERYTHING, he was still my foundation, my rock and my hiding place. Thus far, my life and all that God has given me has not crashed and burned, but I still hold to him like he's all I've got that matters THE most. Oh, btw, the fear of "losing" all that I have "gained" makes it harder to take the risk of being obedient to his call!
