I also believe that Jesus, and the gospel writers, were leaving small human hints along they way in their stories. This is a perfect example. It seems oddly in clandestine with the whole colt thing. It appears that God had maybe for-warned the bystanders of some strangers coming to borrow the neighborhood donkey. Maybe that's what happened. Can I propose another possibility? Jesus is a fantastic friend-maker. I can completely see him going through this neighborhood days or weeks ahead, talking with the locals and seeing the young donkey at someone's house. After some chitchat, some laughter and jokes about the Roman economy, Jesus could have just said, "hey, you mind if I borrow your donkey sometime?" Knowing the hospitality of the neighbors and the deep connection that Jesus makes with people, I'm sure there was a positive - "Sure! Anytime." Then Jesus might have even said, "I'll send my guys for it later." So when I the neighborhood beast. Maybe they wanted to make sure these were Jesus' guys because they were EAGER to loan it out to Jesus! So the guys question, "What are you doing untying the colt?" could have been ensure that Jesus had priority and not just some random strangers. So you may ask, "why make such a big deal out of this odd detail?" And I would say, because of the way Jesus lived his life, with miracles and mundane, that WE TOO can live like Him. The miracles are obvious, the Holy Spirit puts you in a place where faith is required and God HAS to show up. But, we also live in the mundane where we can meander through a neighborhood, store or park and just make friends, being observant of the little nudges and nuances of the Holy Spirit at work.
