lectio // **Isaiah** 43:16-21

This chapter in Isaiah becomes another one of those outbursts of hope. It is wise council for anyone that's come through a difficult season in their life, any leader who dwells on past mistakes and wonders if they've got what it takes to get people where they should be and want to be. It's a wonderful New Year, new you verse for 2021. Because God is always doing a NEW thing! God is always working in creative ways and never needs to repeat himself on how he does it. God's system of regularity is creativity! I come up with ways to make a mundane task more bearable, faster and more efficient. God just comes up with something new and better each time. And each time, I scratch my head and think, "How did God do that?" No two miracles the same, no healings the same, no victories in battle the same. Even God's NEW is always different and better at the same time. And, if there's doubt to how he does it, Isaiah tells us, God just creates a path or a river out of nothing and nowhere! God made a rock into a drinking fountain to give millions of drinks to the Israelites wandering in the desert! That rock ended up producing trillions of gallons of water over the years. I wouldn't be surprised if it's still pumping out water today :) So God's newness isn't just a flashy trick, it's sustainable.
