## lectio // 1 Samuel 9:27-10:8

He was a completely different person, for a time. He prophesied, and was mocked (1 Sam 10:10-12). Right after he was chosen as king, there were hecklers (1 Sam 10:27) and even later in life, songs were made up to compare him to David (1 Sam 18:7). And while the leaders were deciding who would be Israel's first king, he hid. When the lot fell to Saul, they found him hiding among the luggage. Saul was chosen by God, but God also knew who Saul would become. He didn't remain a shy, timid leader either. He turned into a mad king - power had not only turned him against God, it brought out the worst of his fears and reluctancy to go on to live a tormented life in his own mind and in the kingdom as well. One small point of comfort when Saul made his journey to lead. "When Saul returned to his home at Gibeah, a group of men whose hearts God had touched went with him." This IS what every leader needs and looks for to accomplish great things together.
